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Ancient Corinth



Ancient Corinth was one of the most powerful city-states in ancient Greece. Founded in the 10th century BC, it became a major trading hub controlling the narrow Isthmus. The Temple of Apollo (540 BC) still stands with seven of its original columns — one of the oldest stone temples in Greece.

Acrocorinth



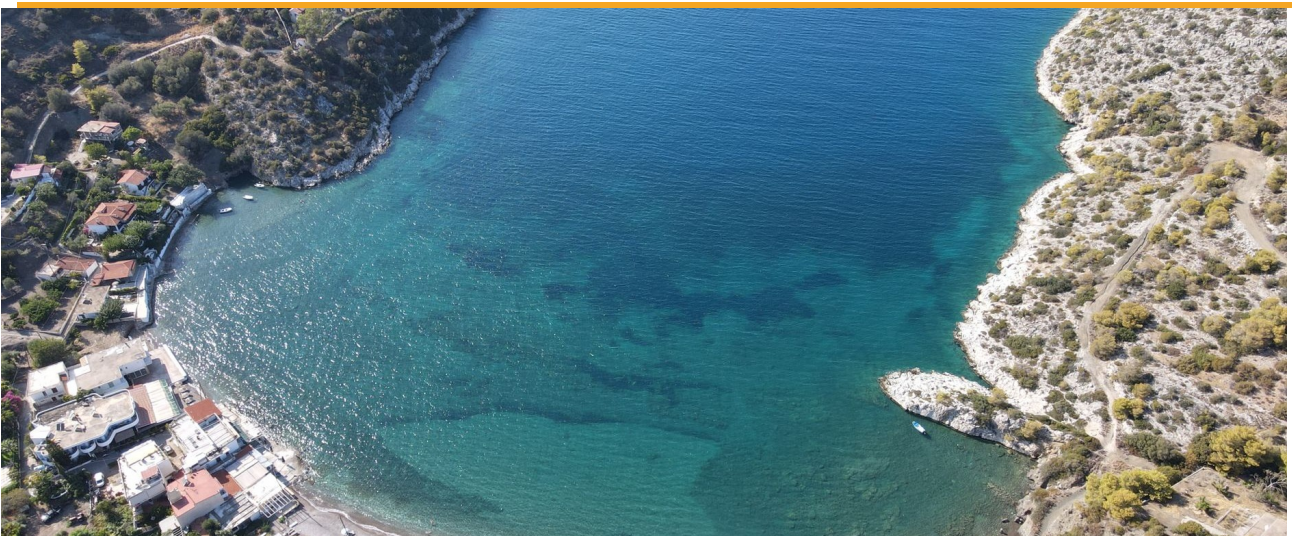
Rising 575 meters above the plain, Acrocorinth is one of the most impressive medieval fortresses in Greece. The climb rewards visitors with breathtaking 360-degree views of both the Corinthian and Saronic gulfs. Inside the walls you'll find remains of temples, churches, mosques, and a Venetian tower.

Corinth Canal



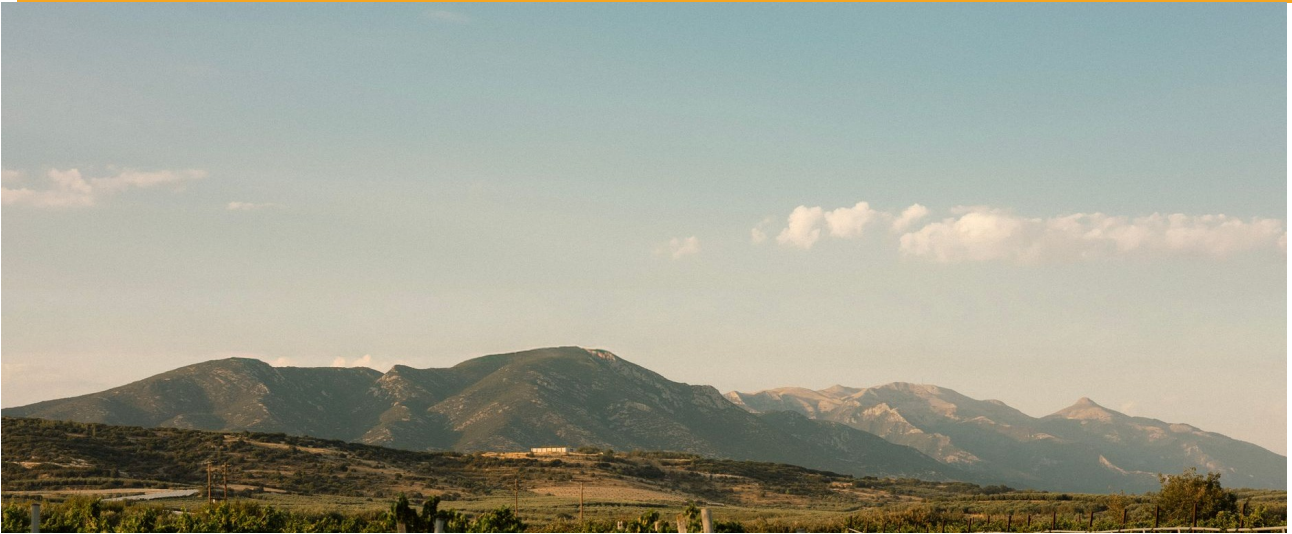
The Corinth Canal is one of Greece's most photographed landmarks. This 6.4 km waterway cuts through the Isthmus, connecting the Gulf of Corinth with the Saronic Gulf. The canal is 21 meters wide and up to 79 meters deep, with sheer limestone walls rising dramatically on either side.

Loutraki



Loutraki is one of Greece's most famous spa towns. Its thermal springs produce mineral water at 31 degrees C, and the town offers a long promenade, organized beaches, and stunning mountain backdrops. Visit Lake Vouliagmeni nearby — a crystal-clear lagoon connected to the sea.

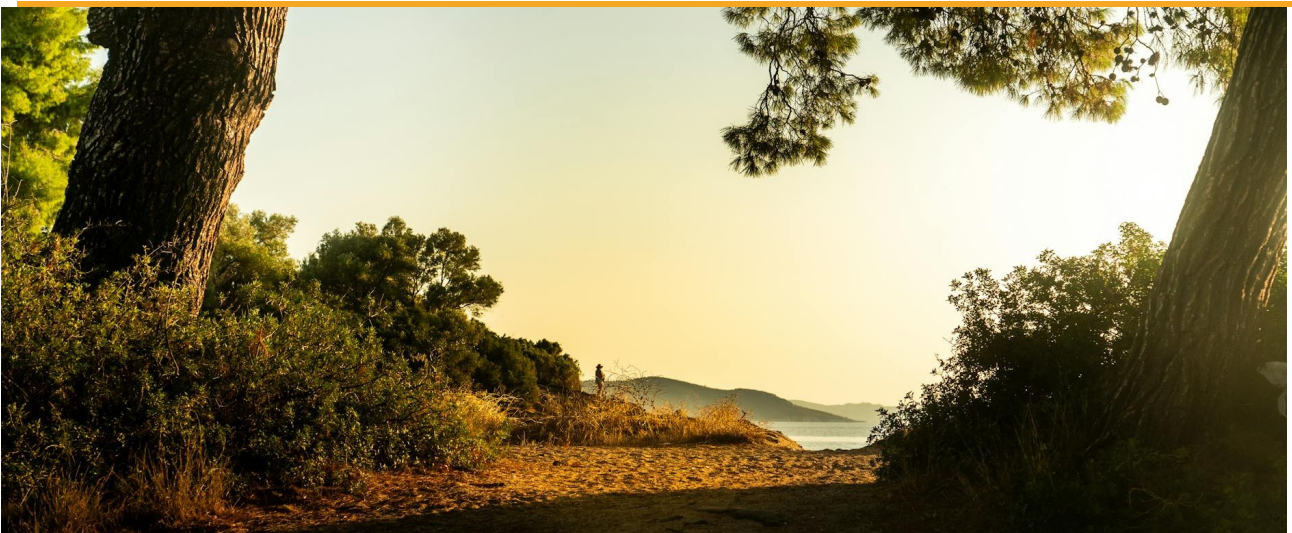
Nemea — Wine Country



Nemea produces the famous Agiorgitiko grape — one of Greece's most important red wine varieties. The region has been a winemaking center for over 3,500 years. Today, dozens of boutique wineries offer tastings, tours, and stunning vineyard views.

The archaeological site includes the Temple of Zeus (330 BC) and the ancient stadium where the Nemean Games were held. Visitors can still run on the ancient track with its original stone starting blocks.

Xylokastro



Known as the 'balcony of the Corinthian Gulf,' Xylokastro is a picturesque seaside town famous for its pine-fringed Pefkias beach and charming pedestrian zone. The waterfront promenade is perfect for evening walks.

Kiato



Kiato is a charming coastal town and the commercial center of eastern Corinthia. With its vibrant waterfront, local tavernas, and easy access to beaches, it's the perfect base for exploring the region. The Suburban Railway connects Kiato directly to Athens.

Trikala Korinthias



A mountain retreat at 1,100 meters altitude, Trikala Korinthias is Corinthia's winter destination. Stone-built villages, traditional tavernas with fireplaces, and access to the Ziria ski center. In summer, the cool mountain air and hiking trails attract those escaping the heat.

Lake Doxa



A serene mountain lake surrounded by fir trees and small chapels. Lake Doxa is the perfect escape for nature lovers — hiking trails, birdwatching, and peaceful picnic spots in a stunning alpine setting.

Heraion of Perachora



An ancient sanctuary dedicated to the goddess Hera, perched on a dramatic headland overlooking the Corinthian Gulf. The site includes temple ruins, a lighthouse, and crystal-clear waters perfect for swimming.

Ancient Sikyon



An often-overlooked archaeological site near Kiato, Ancient Sikyon was once a major center for art and sculpture. The remains include a theater, agora, and Roman baths. Few tourists, maximum atmosphere.
